### Instructions

- Designate a Team Captain. The Team Captain:
  - Shares their screen
  - Inserts the team's answers in the activity
  - Submits the team's completed activity at the end

You are rotating through the outpatient department for your pediatric clerkship. Tomorrow, you are scheduled for a “well-child visit” with Aidan Smith, an infant, and his mother Mrs. Smith. According to Aidan’s electronic health record, Mrs. Smith has previously refused Aidan’s scheduled immunizations, noting she’s read extensively on social media about the risks of vaccines. Your preceptor, Dr. Abramson, suggests that you prepare for the visit by reviewing the evidence on vaccine hesitancy and how to communicate with vaccine-hesitant parents.

### **Finding textbooks to research background questions**

At this stage in your training, Dr. Abramson notes you will have lots of “background questions” - general questions about the fundamentals of a disease, how the human body works, and social and environmental factors that can influence health. She notes that recent textbooks can be useful in answering background questions, and assigns you reading from a textbook in the AccessPediatrics database.

Using "OneSearch" on the [library homepage](#), search for the following textbook:

Shah SS, Kemper AR, Ratner AJ. eds. Pediatric Infectious Diseases: Essentials for Practice, 2e. McGraw-Hill.

Then navigate to the chapter "Vaccine Safety and Risk Communication." Locate and download a PowerPoint slide of FIGURE 3-1, Life cycle of an immunization program.

Use the link for PubMed on the library homepage to search for this article. Use the red "GetIT@WCMC" button in the upper right to download a copy of the full text.

Upload the PDF of the review article you found in PubMed.

When clicking the red "Get It" button, the full text availability page states "No full text available." What's your best option for getting the article?

Google the article and purchase a copy yourself.

Request a copy for free using the "Request from WCM Interlibrary Loan Services" link

Look for a similar article on the same topic and use that instead

### **Publishing research**

As you're searching the literature on vaccination, Dr. Abramson cautions you that not all evidence is of equal quality. She notes the increasing prevalence of "predatory journals," which publish low-quality research with little or no peer review. **Using the Library's [Preparing to Publish guide](#), find a list of clues that a journal may be predatory.**

What's the first "red flag" listed in this list?

Fast publication turnaround

Not indexed in MEDLINE or Scopus

Spelling errors

A flattering email from the journal inviting you to submit your research
